BAND CAMP INFORMATION or What To Do Until Dinner

Here we go again, another Marching Band season. Freshmen should come to campus on Monday, Sept. 7 and check into their dormitories as the first thing. Dorms open at 1:00 PM. Then once you are settled we ask that you come to Old Chapel to sign in with the Band, between 2:00 and 5:00 PM. This also goes for any upperclassmen who have never been in band before. Old Chapel is the gray stone building by the campus pond (with parking space near by). Members of the Personnel Committee will be on hand to greet you and see that you are issued an instrument and locker space. You'll be starting right in to campus life and may have a lot of questions; if so, see anyone of the Personnel Committee members.

After you eat supper, in you own dining commons, we will have a 6:30 PM playing rehearsal in Old Chapel. But this and everything else will be explained when you get here. Carefully read the following pages for more, important information.

Upperclassmen don't have to come to Chapel until between 1:00 and 4:00 PM on Tuesphona day, Sept. 8, when you need to sign in.

Veterans, Mon. and Tues. morning are for the Freshmen only, to get them used to the Band. However, we won't send you away if you want to come down and make friends with your new colleagues. You get in on the come. action 6:30 PM Tues. night when the full band has its first playing rehearsal. So the sure that you've signed in and checked out your instrument by 4:00 PM Tuesday.

A large number of instruments is maintained by the Band Equipment Crew for loan during the year. Accessories such as reeds, valve and slide oil, etc. are also kept in stock and may be purchased at cost.

Upon registering at Old Chapel, please go downstairs (beware of trolls) to the Equipment Room where our fantastic equipment crew will issue you the necessary instruments and locker space. Instruments will be loaned to those Band members who do not own instruments or whose instruments are not suitable for the marching field (we also have instruments for use in the Symphony and Concert Bands). These will be loaned without cost!! In order to insure that we have an instrument and accessories for you, please fill out the equipment section of the attached information form and mail it immediately.

As for lockers, they are available to everyone as they arrive. However, you must supply your own lock (any padlock will do). Band instruments will not be loaned unless you have a lock and anyone with his own instrument will surely want a lock. Be sure you have two keys in case one gets lost.

Certain classes of instruments such as percussion and sousaphones are stored in cages upstairs and are kept locked so that persons playing these instruments need not bring a lock.

UNIFORMS

The official University of Massachusetts Marching Band Uniform will be provided to all marchers. This will consist of a coat, trousers, overlay, hat, plume, protective bag, gloves, spats, and (cont'd. page 3)

INSTRUMENTATION

A BIRD'S EYE VIEW



Spring tour will again be during the Easter break, and we'll be going to Springfield, Worcester, Boston, Lowell(!), and Providence, Rhode Island. This is still tentative, though.

For those planning to join Symphony Band there will be auditions all day Friday, Sept. 11th. There will be a sign up sheet for you to choose the most convenient time to audition. Preference will be given to Marching Band personnel in final selections. Rehearsal schedule will be: Tues. at 7-8:15 PM. During Marching season and Monday, Wednesday, Friday at 4:40 PM after Marching season is over. Note, there is no Friday 3:30 rehearsal!!

The Concert Band at the University is open to all interested students without audition and gives two performances each spring. Members choose their own seats and play the parts they feel they can handle. This year's Concert Band will basically be the Marching Band moved indoors. To receive credit for Concert Band the first semester a person must also play in the Marching Band. Likewise, to receive credit for Marching Band a student must play in the Concert Band the few weeks remaining at the end of the football season. Concert Band will not meet until Marching Band is over and then it will go to its regular schedule of Tuesday and Thursday at 4:40. Setup for the spring semester will be as in the past, two times a week for one cre-

This year's directors will be Mr. Larry Weed, Mr. Dennis Behm, and various student conductors. Mr. Weed has chosen some fabulous and varied scores for the Band to perform. The repertoire will include:

PEP BAND

The Pep Band, the formerly student organized band for basketball games, will take on a different character in 1970-71. For many years a need has been felt to provide senior Music Education majors with more conducting opportunities. The Pep Band presents an ideal solution. In 1970-71 the Pep Band will be co-run by Mr. Weed and the senior Music Education majors.

As always, the group will be voluntary, but a tentative instrumentation will be maintained. Hopefully, there will be enough alternates so that the game schedule will not be too demanding. Interested students should see Mr. Weed early in the Marching Band season. Pep Band will begin at the end of the football season and membership will be restricted to Concert, Symphony, and Marching Band memberships.
